Create a Safe Environment: Provide a comfortable and supportive space where your child feels safe to express themselves. Encourage open communication and listen to their feelings and thoughts.

Use Visual Supports: Visual aids, such as social stories and picture cards, can help your child understand social cues and appropriate responses.


Encourage Playdates: Organise playdates with peers in a structured environment.

Model Social Behaviour: Demonstrate positive social interactions in everyday situations. Show your child how to greet others, make eye contact, and use polite language.
