Dear Parents/ Caregivers,

Next week is National Road Safety week. Walking to school as much as possible is a great opportunity to reiterate the importance of road safety and the importance of being physically active with your child/ren. As part of the initiative, all Hub students will receive a road safety session from the RAA on either Wednesday 8th or Wednesday 15th May.

On Friday 10th May, we encourage all Hub students and their parents/ caregivers to celebrate Walk Safely to School Day by walking to school, or part of the journey. Staff and Year 6 leaders will be positioned at the front and back gate of the school, in the morning, to acknowledge those students who walked to school. We will also be surveying the classes throughout the day to see which class had the most students walk to school that day, weather it was part of or all of the journey.

Looking forward to seeing those students walking to school via the back gate on my normal before school duty.

Emu Crossing - Students Crossing

Our Emu crossing is also located at the front of our school. It has white road markings, red and white posts and operates only when the children's crossing flags are displayed. Most importantly a speed limit of 25 km/h applies to all drivers when children are present. Drivers must stop for pedestrians using or about to use our Emu crossing.

National Simultaneous Storytime





On Wednesday 22nd of May our students will be watching a live stream reading of the book, Bowerbird Blues.




WHICH LANGUAGE AT THE HUB 2025?

Japanese

- Japanese has been taught in Australia for more than 100 years and is widely taught as a second language in Australian schools.
- There are 132 schools offering a Japanese language program.
- The strong relationship between Australia and Japan has led to many collaborative projects in education and intercultural exchange.
- Learning Japanese will help students learn to appreciate and understand the Japanese culture, including how to speak and write words and phrases.
- Japanese is roughly divided into three dialectal groups: Eastern (Eastern and Northeastern Honshu, Hokkaido), Western (Western Honshu and Shikoku), Southern (Kyushyu). (Alpatov 1998). Dialects from different areas can be so different that they are not mutually intelligible, but most speakers are able to communicate in standard Japanese, which is based on the Tokyo dialect.

Auslan

What is Auslan?

Auslan is Australian Sign Language, the native language of the Australian Deaf community. It uses manual communication such as hand shapes (including orientation, location and movement), non-manual features (including eye gaze, facial expressions and body postures) and gestures to express thoughts and meaning. Auslan was added as an official language in the Australian Curriculum in 2016 with many schools quickly taking it on as their Language Other Than English (LOTE).

Benefits to Learning Auslan:

Incorporating Auslan into a school's program has many benefits for both Deaf and hearing children.

Auslan can:

- Improve spatial awareness and multi-tasking skills
- Strengthen memory and contribute to better cognitive and emotional development
- Improve hand eye coordination
- Improve overall literacy skills
- Increase enjoyment and inclusivity in communicating for both hearing and deaf children
- Aid as an alternate form of communication when verbal communication may be difficult e.g. when angry or upset

Fingerspelling

Fingerspelling is used to sign proper nouns such as names of people/places or movie/TV titles. Use your dominant hand to form each letter and perform any movements.



Español (Spanish)

EASY TO LEARN

Spanish is among the first level of languages that are easiest to learn for native English speakers (*Japanese is in the hardest level)


30-40% of all words in English have a related word in Spanish; with a similar sound, appearance and meaning like *fabuloso, hotel & inteligente*.

Spanish is a phonetic language; each letter has a single corresponding sound (each letter has only ONE way to pronounce it!)

Spanish and English share almost identical alphabets

English uses many borrowed Spanish words like *taco, patio, tortilla*, These similarities mean that we often review English grammar before learning; Spanish helps students with their English!


