Grounds and Facilities Committee

The Grounds and Facilities Committee are working through a number of items to enhance safety and learning experiences at our school. A few items we discussed include:

Professional Development

We started our Restorative Practices journey with a specialised training day for staff on our recent Pupil Free Day on 7 March. Restorative Practices is an evidence-based approach to conflict resolution and empowers students, staff and parents/caregivers with skills to guide young people through navigating and resolving conflict in a safe, peaceful and lasting way. Hosted by Kerrie Sellen, a world-leading expert in Restorative Practices, we are rolling out further workshops throughout the year for staff, students and parents/caregivers who wish to be involved.

Site Learning Plan 2025

Our focus for our Site Learning Plan in 2025 (formerly School Improvement Plan) is aligned with the **Purpose for Public Education strategy** across three Areas of Impact:

Effective Learners

- Positive Behaviours for Learning
- Ethical use of AI in learning

Equity and Excellence

Wellbeing

- Inclusivity and flexibility across learning opportunities
- Growing students' connectedness and belonging with school

Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL)

Positive Behaviours for Learning is a consistent approach to reward positive behaviours that enhance learning and addresses negative behaviours. It fosters a safe, supportive and conducive learning environment. We are in our first year of introducing this school-wide approach and taking actions to plan how we can enhance our learning systems and environment at Nuriootpa High School.

Mobile Phones

We are exploring ways to further enhance our Mobile Phone Policy, prioritise focus on learning and reducing distractions, in line with the state-wide ban of Mobile Phones for public schools.

We are exploring the opportunity of Yondr Pouches, which help to keep phones safely stored away during the school day and reduce the distraction / temptation for students' to access these without prior permission.

- Over 30 schools are using this successfully in South Australia.
- We are exploring this further, hearing from and working with stakeholders across our school to see how this could help students focus more on learning and reduce distractions.

We are also looking to phase-out student payment by Mobile Phones at school, providing a take up time over Term 2 for families to organise alternative payment methods for students such as bank card, cash and Spriggy application (for the School Canteen). We appreciate your partnership around this, as we look to strengthen and build on the positive work already undertaken around Mobile Phones.

School Holidays

As we near the end of Term 1, there is much to acknowledge and celebrate in terms of student efforts and achievements. Well done to all of our students on your hard work, towards your individual aspirations and goals. Have a safe and productive School Holiday period.

I look forward to working in partnership with you and our broader community in Term 2.

SCHOOL CARD ASSISTANCE

School Card Applications are now <u>overdue</u>. If you think you may be eligible for School Card please complete the online application form at the link below ASAP.

School Card is available in government schools to:

- families with children aged 4 years and over who attend a school full time
- independent full time students studying year 10, 11 or 12
- Adult re-entry students undertaking subjects to complete their SACE.

To qualify, your family's gross income in the 2022/23 financial year must be below the threshold, based on the number of dependent children you have in your family.

School Card covers \$396 of the Materials & Services Charge. The additional \$114 of Material & Services charge will be waived if School Card is approved. *Families must apply for School Card annually*.

Don't leave these financial matters too late, as per the Nuriootpa High School Debt Collection Policy all outstanding charges for 2025 will be sent to the Recoveries Unit at the Attorney General Office.

We thank all the families that have already attended to the above payments, these help our students to undertake the fundamental elements of their educational programs.

ART EXCURSION


Dear parents or caregivers

Please complete your contact details and indicate to us bus stop arrangements for your child. We may need to contact you if your child is not able to be set down from the bus if it appears to the bus driver that no responsible adult is present.

You will know that where a parent or carer is not present at the school bus drop off point, as provided in this notice, the bus driver is required to follow the school communication and ie.
