

#### **SITE LEARNING PLAN – SLP**

All educators continue to support our learners to develop their connection and language around the Engagement Continuum, the Learning Pit and brain science. Effective Learners is our main area of impact and our integrated work with these three constructs continues to help develop and strengthen a sustainable shift in how we think about learning at Robe Primary School.

Education must develop children and young people who can learn, not only when they are being taught. At preschool and school and throughout their lives, learners need to develop the skills to be effective learners so that they can make the most of future opportunities and respond to changes in their worlds.

**Curiosity** - Learners ask questions to 'get to the bottom of it' and are less accepting of received wisdom until it is evidenced.

**Creativity** - Learners think 'outside the box', take chances, use imagination and intuition and are receptive to hunches and inklings.

**Meaning making** - Learners make connections between past information and/or experiences and new knowledge.

**Strategic awareness** - Learners know what to do when they don't know what to do.

**Metacognition and self-regulation** - Learners who can stop and think about what's needed to best achieve the task in front of them. Learners are able to understand and manage their behaviour and reactions to their environment.

## **SOCIAL MEDIA**

**Did you know...** Both houses of Federal Parliament have voted to approve legislation to protect Australian children from social media, following strong and sustained advocacy from the Malinauskas Labor Government. The Albanese Labor Government secured passage of the world-leading legislation to enforce a minimum age of 16 years for social media. The bill is modelled on framework legislation prepared by former Chief Justice of the High Court the Honourable Robert French AC, at the request of South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas.

The State Government has been determined to progress a ban on social media for children amid mounting concern and recognition from experts, clinicians, and educators of the negative impacts of unregulated social media use on children's mental health, wellbeing and development. The State Government's strong preference has been for nationally consistent legislation, which has now passed the Senate.

The federal law will require social media platforms to take reasonable steps to prevent under 16s from having accounts, placing the onus of responsibility on these corporations rather than parents or children. Significant financial penalties of up to \$49.5 million will apply for systemic breaches by social media giants. The Bill and the associated rules will ensure young Australians have continued access to messaging and online gaming, as well as access to services which are health and education related, like Headspace, Kids Helpline, Google Classroom, and YouTube.



### HOW TO COMPLETE THE CHALLENGE?

To complete the Premier's Reading Challenge students need to read **12 books** between week 1, term 1 and week 7 term 3.

1. Every student will need a Student Reading Record. This is available from the school's Premier's Reading Challenge coordinator (school front office) or can be downloaded via link above.
2. Read 12 books. Eligible books include e-books, audio books, class/shared reading, prescribed books for school, non-fiction books, books read as research for assignments or books in another language.
3. **Reception to year 6:** Students must read 8 books from the Premier's Reading Challenge booklist (you will find plenty of PRC books in our school library) and 4 personal choice books.
4. Complete the Student Reading Record with the title and author for each book. A parent, caregiver, teacher or librarian must sign off on each book to verify it has been read.
5. Pass on the completed Student Reading Record to the school's Premier's Reading Challenge coordinator by the designated due date, Friday 5<sup>th</sup> September, 2025.
6. Receive an award in late November.
