Over the past few weeks, we have had a number of exciting learning opportunities and events across the school.

Our Aquatics program was a great success, with students participating in two very positive and enjoyable days at the pool. Students demonstrated confidence, resilience, and safe behaviours in the water, and it was wonderful to see their skills continue to develop.

Our teachers recently attended a Professional Learning Day focused on Learning Expeditions, which will be shaping the learning happening in classrooms. The Upper Primary class has begun exploring their inquiry through Technologies and Health, with students investigating meaningful, real-world questions and applying their learning in creative ways. We were also fortunate to have Marley Fairclough visit the school to deliver Surf Life Saving education sessions. Students learned about a range of important beach and water safety

- ·understanding rips and how to respond safely

concepts, including:

the role of surf lifesavers and how to seek help in an emergency

Students have also participated in Remembrance Day learning and activities, showing respect and understanding as they reflected on the significance of the day, why we commemorate this and the sacrifices made by service men and women.

Bushfires and the law

Police officers have the lawful authority to take preventative action to stop bushfires from

Did you know it is an offence to:

- Light or maintain a fire in the open during the Fire Danger Season, unless you comply with the following requirements: The fire is contained in a properly constructed freplace, a portable cooking appliance or a trench at least 30
- The space immediately around and above the fire is cleared of all flammable vegetation to a distance of at least centimetres deep, and
 - four metres; and
- The fire does not occupy an area larger than one square metre; and

A person proposes to carry out an activity of a kind prescribed by the regulations, or any other activity that may cause

If a police officer is satisfied that

The law states:

Then a police officer may direct that person to stop the activity during a period specified in the direction

Due to weather conditions, the fire, (if caused by the activity), might get out of control

What is an activity of a kind prescribed by regulations??

There are many specific activities, but common ones include

Operating an appliance for welding, soldering, metal cutting, grinding or abrasion.

Operating a gas fire or electrical cooking element

Lighting and maintaining a fire.

starting. This authority applies all year round, not just during the Fire Danger Season.

- A person who can control the fire is present at the site of the fire from the time it is lighted to the time it is completely extinguished; and
 - There is an appropriate agent adequate to extinguish the fire at hand
- If a Total Fire Ban Day has been declared in your district, you must not light a campfire or any fire for warmth or comfort without a council permits

Other offences during the Fire Danger Season:

- On a declared Total Fire Ban Day, a Schedule 10 council permit is required to light a fire otherwise it is an offence Lighting a fire to burn off on your property or burn rubbish or grass clippings without a Schedule 9 council permit
 - abrasion that produces sparks in the open air is not permitted unless you comply with the following requirements: The space immediately around and above the applicance is cleared of all flammable vegetation to a distance of all Using an appliance for welding or soldering with an exposed flame or an appliance for metal cutting, grinding or
- There is an appropriate agent to extinguish the fire at hand; and

least 10 metres; and

- A person who can control the appliance must be present at all times while the appliance is in use or alight.
- Use is not permitted on a Total Fire Ban Day without a permit?

More offences to be aware of at any time of the year:

- Dropping or throwing a burning object or material from a vehicle
- Burning in the open is regulated for environmental and air quality reasons. Failure to obtain the required permit under environmental protection laws is an offence. Contact your local council for advice
 - Using private freworks¹⁰.

Require a person to provide such information as may be reasonably required in the circumstances*

Direct or prohibit the movement of persons, animals or vehicles³
