Throughout NAIDOC and Reconciliation Week last term our class created their own football guernsey or netball dresses. Some students used their totems or used Aboriginal designs that made them feel connected to their culture or family. The students drew them using pencils or textas and then we then used AI to create them.

I would like to introduce myself - my name is Josie Poulton and I have been teaching since 2007. I spent my first 15 years working as a primary years classroom teacher at the same school. Since then, I have been a new arrivals teacher, teaching English to non-English speaking students. I have worked in Special Education at two schools in the North Eastern area. My passions in teaching have always been the Arts, Science and Mathematics.

After doing relief work here since Term 1, I was fortunate enough to be offered a full time contract as a specialist teacher, teaching Science and Visual Arts and one day a week as a classroom teacher, until the end of 2025.

Our Science focus has been on forces. Students have been making predictions, designing, making and doing investigations about forces. Students have been involved in activities to understand motion, looking at push and pull as well as gravity and friction. We've investigated if items will sink or float. This week, students designed and made sailboats and tested to see if they would float. We also weighted the sailboats down with rocks to see how many rocks they could hold before they sank. A lot of students were surprised at how well-made their boats were and how many rocks it took to sink them. Some boats held more than 50 rocks before they sank!



In Art, we have been learning about art techniques and use of colour from famous artists past and present. Students then put these techniques into practice in their own pieces of art. Each week we learn about new techniques and artists. So far, we have learnt about Andy Warhol, Piet Mondrian and Romero Britto. Each week we will be trying new
