Dear Families,

As we move into the heart of Term 2, it's been encouraging to see our students continue to grow, not only academically, but also in their mindset, resilience, and engagement with learning.

A key focus this term has been

metacognition, helping students become more aware of how they learn, not just what they learn. Across all year levels, our teachers are modelling and teaching strategies that encourage students to reflect on their thinking, set goals, monitor their progress, and evaluate outcomes. These are powerful, lifelong skills. When students understand how they learn best, they become more independent, more motivated, and better equipped to tackle challenges.

Aligned with this is our emphasis on developing a growth mindset, the belief that abilities and intelligence can be developed through dedication and effort. We're reinforcing to students that mistakes are part of learning, effort matters, and persistence pays off. This mindset is vital not just for academic success, but for building confident, capable young people who are ready for the future.

One of the highlights in recent weeks has been the Year 8 and Year 9 Camps. These experiences are always a favourite, offering students the chance to challenge themselves, grow in independence, and build new friendships. From outdoor adventures to team-building activities, it's been fantastic to see students embracing these opportunities with such enthusiasm and maturity. A huge thank you to our staff for their time and commitment, your support makes these valuable experiences possible.

We were also pleased to receive financial support for country students affected by drought, enabling their participation in camps and excursions. This assistance comes through the Department for Education as part of the State Government's \$73 million Drought Support Package.

Year 9 Camp at Nyroca – Week 5 Highlights



The caving experience challenged every student physically and mentally. With headlamps on and nerves pushed aside, students crawled through tight spaces, encouraged one another, and showed incredible teamwork. Some brave explorers ventured deep into the caves to discover a stunning hidden chamber full of stalactites and stalagmites—nature's slow-motion artwork, forming at just 10 centimetres every 1,000 years!

Back at the Nyroca campgrounds, the evenings were filled with laughter, games of chasey, rope swings, board games, campfire chats, marshmallows and brain teasers around the fire, and kicking the footy. Students all pitched in for meal prep and cleanup, showing respect and responsibility. And yes, everyone went to bed nice and early... of course.

Day 2 took the group to Mount Greenly, where they geared up for a morning of rock climbing. The students learned all the roles involved—from belayer (the one holding the rope and, essentially, someone's life!), to anchor (the one stopping the belayer from being yanked up the cliff!), and of course, the climber. Almost every student gave it a go, tackling climbs of varying difficulty. Some conquered all three routes multiple times, displaying leadership, trust, and loads of support for their classmates. And everyone stayed *perfectly* calm under pressure... *definitely no nerves or squeals heard at all!*

The afternoon hike to the summit of Mount Greenly was breathtaking. The view was nothing short of spectacular—a powerful reminder of how lucky we are to live along such a stunning coastline.

On the final day, the group made one last stop at the Sheringa Sand Dunes. With sandboards and toboggans in hand, students zoomed (and occasionally tumbled) down the slopes. A few natural talents emerged, while others... well, let's just say they wore the sand home.

A huge congratulations to the Year 9 students for making the most of every moment, facing challenges head-on, and showing such great character throughout the trip. Camps like these remind us why these experiences are so important—and why staff keep signing up to run them!


