As part of our learning expedition, "How does the past shape our future?", students have been exploring the concept of values, where they come from, how they guide us, and what they mean both personally and as a school community.

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Lower Primary

It has been a busy start to the term! In Maths students have been introduced to a fluency program called 'Facts on Fire' where students work to improve their speed and accuracy in number operations. It has generated a lot of enthusiasm and excitement and has supported the development of speedy recording and calculation skills. We have also been learning about subtraction and money. Our classroom toy shop has been a very successful business with many customers. In our writing sessions we have used the storybook 'How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth' by Michelle Robinson to explore procedural writing. We then wrote our own procedures on how to wash a car, before reviewing our skills by working together to create a procedure on "How to Do a Bushfire Drill". Our next writing focus will be on poetry using "The Swing" by Robert Louis Stevenson as a springboard into learning.



Upper Primary

In HASS this term, students are exploring the states and territories of Australia and discovering what makes each one unique. They have learned that every state and territory has its own official flag, colours, animal, fish, bird, and slogan. To showcase their understanding, students are creating a lapbook, a project that allows them to present what makes each state and territory special in a creative and organised way.


















In writing, we have been learning how to create a book report. We read *Finding Our Heart* by Thomas Mayo and discovered that a book report has two key parts. The first is the **book summary**, where we briefly explain the story or plot so the reader can understand what the book is about without having to read it. The second is the **personal response**, where we share our own thoughts and opinions about the book.



Mini Golf Fun in PE!

Students have been learning all about mini golf this term!

Over the past three weeks, they've practised aiming, putting, and controlling the ball safely, showing persistence and teamwork along the way. After mastering their putting skills, students worked in groups to design and build their own mini golf holes using school materials, complete with ramps, stairs, tunnels, and creative obstacles.

The unit finished with a whole-school mini golf course, where everyone had the chance to play each other's creations. It was fantastic to see students demonstrating sportsmanship, creativity, and respect while having so much fun.

Morning Circle Routine

At the start of Term 4, we introduced a new Morning Circle Routine, a positive way to begin each day, grounded in trauma-informed practice and the Be Good People social–emotional learning curriculum.

Each morning, the whole school gathers to connect through a greeting of choice, daily notices, and a positive primer, something fun to spark thinking, like a question, riddle, or joke (for example: is cereal soup?).

Each week focuses on a new topic, exploring our values, communication skills, and expectations through pair-and-share discussions.

Drawing on the Berry Street Education Model, this routine helps build stronger relationships, deeper connections, and a true sense of belonging across our school community.







Walking the Seasons with Elders – Learning, Listening, and Growing on Country

In Week 4 of Term 4, students took part in the final 'Walking the Seasons' excursion for the year, during Kangaroo and Grass Seed Time (November–December). Led by Uncle Doug and the Landscape Board, the day offered rich opportunities to connect with Boandik Country and deepen understanding of seasonal change.

Students were split into two groups: one joined Uncle Doug to learn about Indigenous use of the land, practising fire starting, boomerang throwing, and dancing to the didgeridoo, while collecting beautifully painted stones on a short bush walk. The second group explored the Honan Mint Trail and boardwalk, refining their observation skills by spotting the last of the orchids, flowering grass trees, and bird calls, with Belle and Paige recognised as outstanding observers.

A videographer and photographer accompanied the excursion to capture the program for presentation at the World Indigenous Education Conference in New Zealand, a wonderful recognition of our school's ongoing partnership in cultural learning.

Students returned to school inspired, proud, and full of new insights into how the land, its seasons, and its stories connect us all.









Facilities Upgrade

We're pleased to share that the Arena upgrade was completed early this term. Clear panels have been installed along the side of our undercover arena, bringing in natural light and improving visibility across the space.

This upgrade not only enhances safety for yard duty teachers but also increases supervision and connection across the playground. The clearer space now allows students to play and move freely behind the arena, effectively extending our outdoor play and learning areas.

Students are loving the extra space and freedom, and the added sunlight has brightened the under-arena mural, making it stand out beautifully in the afternoons. It's a small change that's already making a big difference to how the area feels and functions.

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A reminder to all families that classes open and teachers are on duty from 8:30am each day, prior to this time staff are not on duty to supervise children. Remembrance Day 2025









Science

Term four science classes have been focused on forces. The junior primary class have experimented with various types of push and pull forces to make objects move. They have discovered how pushing and pulling can change the shape of some substances, and the same force can have different effects on different objects. The students have experimented with sound waves. They have created vibrations with their voices, guitar strings, xylophones, and drums. The students amplified sounds and dulled them.

The upper primary students have been learning about electricity. They have all successfully made circuits to light a light bulb. The students experimented with different insulators and conductors, and made an electric helicopter, speakers, and a merry-go-round. They have learnt about the inventors of the light bulb and the debate between AC and DC currents.



Preparing for a bushfire

Our school has emergency management and localised bushfire response plans in place to keep your child safe during the fire danger season or in the event of a bushfire.

To help us keep your child as safe as possible, parents and caregivers can prepare for the fire danger season by:

- making a bushfire survival plan with your family
- providing us with your up-to-date contact details
- advising the school/preschool if your family's personal bushfire survival plan will impact school attendance
- talking to your child about what will happen in a bushfire emergency
- liking and following the CFS, SES and SAPOL pages on Facebook
- adding the Security and Emergency unit information number 1800 000 279 to your contacts.

Parents and caregivers should also read and save the <u>bushfire and your child's school or preschool</u> brochure. This resource explains what our school will do on an extreme and catastrophic fire danger day or in the event of a fire. Get the brochure by searching 'bushfire information' on <u>www.education.sa.gov.au</u>.

Please note that Kongorong Primary School and Child Parent Centre are considered an R2 (high risk) rated sites and will be automatically closed and transport services cancelled on catastrophic fire danger days. Communication would be sent to families informing of site closure. In the event a catastrophic fire danger rating is called after the commencement of the school day, the site would remain open and transport run as per normal unless an emergency event takes precedence.
