Teaching and learning

During our pupil free day held this term teachers continued to build their knowledge of the new SA Curriculum with a focus on the **dispositions** for each learning area.

What are they? A disposition is an enduring attitude, belief, value or pattern of thinking that influences behaviour and decisions throughout life.

Dispositions are the 'be' element in the SA Curriculum learning standards – who learners are becoming.

Why it matters? The intentional development of positive dispositions leads to habits of mind that impact an individual's actions and responses to situations and influence wellbeing, learning and academic success. Positive dispositions enable learners to:

Embrace struggle

- see mistakes as a natural part of learning
- investigate what they are curious about



Teachers also participated in learning about the FROG Learning Management System; a platform we will be using within the Education Management System (EMS). Part of this session involved teachers beginning to design and set up their own Classroom Hubs. These Frog Hubs will provide a central location for each classroom teacher to share information about learning, resources,

announcements, and communication between school and home.

Our home state of South Australia in Room 16

In Room 16, the Year 2s have been learning all about our home state of South Australia, including its emblems and their significance. We've explored the meaning behind symbols like the Sturt's Desert Pea and the piping shrike, and discussed why these emblems are important to our identity as South Australians. To finish our learning, the students will design their own personal emblems that represent something special about themselves. It's been a fun and creative way to connect with our state and reflect on who we are!









Chemical Sciences in Room 2

In Science this term Room 2 has been studying Chemical Sciences. We have investigated properties of different materials and been learning that materials are selected for purpose based on their properties. On Tuesday afternoons we have been lucky enough to have some parent helpers come in and assist us in running some Science Investigations. We have had different challenges we have had to work through. We are creating boats out of straws to sail a small animal across the water, towers out of spaghetti and plasticine to hold some classroom objects, marble mazes using playdough, and weaving baskets out of paper. For all of these investigations we have had to manipulate different materials, by weaving, rolling, pushing, pulling threading, stacking and sticking to change their shape.

We have used our metacognition in our discussions about what we already know about materials and how we can add this to our designs. After we have completed our creations we have discussed what we would do differently to our designs next time to improve on them and have enjoyed giving each other feedback. A big thank you to all the parents who have come to support our learning!

I made my boat out of paper straws. If I had to make it again I would use plastic because the paper straws were not waterproof. Toby




I used paper straws for my boat too. It worked okay because I covered them in sticky tape to make them waterproof! Raffi

- Years 3 6, are responsible for recording books on their own form. <u>8 of these books</u> <u>MUST be from the Challenge booklists</u>, as labelled on our school books or available on our website www.prc.sa.edu.au, and 4 more of their own choice.

Books for students in years 3,4 & 5 will have a <u>GREEN LABEL</u> on the cover. Books for students in Year 6 will have a <u>YELLOW LABEL</u> on the cover. Please check that they are recording books read of the appropriate level.



Student reading records are available from your student's teacher, or from the school contact person in the school library.

Research confirms reading to children just 10 minutes each day strengthens literacy, models positive reading behaviour, and builds children's self-esteem about reading (especially for boys).



It doesn't stop there. You can show your children that you value reading by reading yourself. Having books in your house makes a big difference too. Either books you own or books you borrow from the library remind children of the importance and fun of reading.
