Class Placement processes are almost complete

We have endeavoured to establish balanced classes and to place all students in a learning environment that will support them to be successful. Most students are with at least one of their nominated friends.

Students will have an opportunity later in the term to visit their 2026 classrooms and met their classmates and teachers.

We ask that you support your child with managing this change by focusing on the positive aspects of their placement. Talk about the peers they will be with, and how they can connect with other friends during break times. This will help your child to build resilience and bounce back if any initial disappointment is evident.

Outdoor Play Space update

On Monday the Supernova Spinner was opened for children to use. The spinner can be found in the Nature Play area and has been very popular!

The Year 1 - 6 SRC leaders developed agreements for use to support all children to enjoy this new equipment safely.

- Only 6 students (or less) at a time
- No pushing people off
- Treat the Supernova respectfully
- No running or jumping on it must be sitting or laying
- If you are waiting for your turn, stay a good distance away so you don't get hurt or hurt others.

There are many benefits for our children using this equipment.

The spinner allows children to experience changes in motion, speed and direction as well as developing their balance, coordination and awareness of how their body moves. In addition, children develop their teamwork, social skills, resilience and patience.

We are all eagerly awaiting the completion of the trampoline installation which has been delayed due to the unexpected weather conditions we have been experiencing.

Upper primary students plan a trip to Japan!




Our Upper Primary students have been very busy putting their thinking and planning skills to work as they design their very own dream trip to Japan!
