


A NOTE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

This term, we had the pleasure of welcoming 22 new Reception students. Bullying No Way: National week of action 11 to 15 August 2025

Be Bold. Be Kind. Speak Up.

How bullying awareness is taught through the curriculum: In the Australian Curriculum, bullying is addressed progressively from Foundation to Year 6 through the Health and Physical Education (HPE) learning area. While the word "bullying" is introduced explicitly from Year 3 onwards, the building blocks to understand and respond to bullying begin much earlier.

<u>Foundation to Year 2</u>: Children learn about emotions, forming friendships, staying safe, and identifying trusted adults. These skills help them navigate social situations and build empathy—key foundations for recognising bullying later on.

<u>Years 3-4</u>: Students begin to learn what bullying is, how to recognise different types (like verbal, physical, and social bullying), and how to respond safely. They also practise respectful communication and empathy.

<u>Years 5-6</u>: Students explore more complex aspects of bullying, including online bullying and peer pressure. They learn strategies to manage relationships, be supportive bystanders, and use help-seeking skills both online and offline.

This staged approach helps children develop the knowledge, confidence, and social skills they need to build respectful relationships and respond effectively to bullying.



In term 4 we're excited to welcome Dolly's Dream to our school to support our ongoing work in promoting kindness, respect, and online safety.

Dolly's Dream was established in memory of 14-yearold Dolly Everett, and it aims to prevent bullying and cyberbullying through education and community support.

During their visit, trained presenters will deliver ageappropriate sessions for students from Foundation to Year 6, focusing on:

- Building respectful friendships and relationships
- Understanding and preventing bullying and cyberbullying
- · Safe and responsible use of technology
- Recognising emotions and seeking help when needed

The sessions are engaging, supportive, and designed to empower students with practical strategies to stay safe, be kind, and speak up. We're proud to partner with Dolly's Dream to help build a safer, more inclusive school community for every child.



Is your child ready to be sitting in an adult seat in your vehicle?

Children aged between 7 and 16 years are required to use a *booster seat* or *adult seat belt* when travelling in a vehicle. An adult lap sash seatbelt is designed for people of a *minimum height* of 145cms and over (the average age children reach this height is between 10 to 12 years old).

The safest option for your child will depend on your child's height – do <u>the five step test</u> to find out.



Bordertown Primary School Uniform Policy

Parents/guardians are able to request an exemption for their child from the uniform code to be considered by the school Principal.

School jumpers, polo shirts and school backpacks can be purchased from Navana Clothing on Woolshed Street in Bordertown.

Navy school bucket hats are available to purchase from the front office at the school. These can also be purchased on the Qkr! App for \$9.00 each. School beanies can be purchased for \$15.00 each.

Second hand uniforms are often available from the Community Op on East Terrace or The Hive on Woolshed Street, Bordertown.

Students are required to wear suitable footwear at all times. Enclosed, supportive shoes such as sand shoes are recommended. Thongs, crocs, rubber boots and slip-on shoes are NOT to be worn to school.

Iron on labels are available at the front office for \$4.00.

Dear Parents and Caregivers

At Bordertown Primary School, we have several students with various allergies with potential anaphylaxis. We are seeking your help to support these students.

Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction that is potentially life-threatening. The most common causes of anaphylaxis in schools are allergies to food and insects (bees). To help manage allergies, our school is following the National Allergy Council's Best Practice Guidelines for Anaphylaxis Prevention and Management in Schools.

The Best Practice Guidelines recommend an Allergy Aware approach, which means we are supporting students at risk of anaphylaxis in the following ways:

- training staff
- educating students about allergies and anaphylaxis
- · teaching students that we all have different needs and to be respectful of others
- teaching students the importance of getting help immediately if their friend with allergy looks sick.

For food allergies, we are also:

- · encouraging all students to wash their hands before and after eating
- teaching students not to share food with friends while at school

Exposure to allergens can trigger an allergic/anaphylaxis reaction.

To ensure the safety of all students, I encourage you to be mindful of the items included in your child's lunch box. Food allergies are common in school aged children and avoiding the food is the only way to prevent an allergic reaction. Therefore, we have put a range of different risk controls in place to help keep these students safe while at school. These measures aim to minimise students' exposure to allergens.

I kindly ask you to discuss this matter with your child. Educating children about allergies is crucial in fostering a safe and supportive school environment.

Dear families

Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) is a critical service for many parents, carers, families, and learners. Access to OSHC supports the changing needs and work commitments of parents and carers, and contributes to a supportive, healthy environment where learners can build their independence and social skills.

The Department for Education is seeking input and advice from families about the demand for OSHC services across South Australia (SA) through participation in a short survey.

We thank the families who participated in the 2024 survey. Responding to the survey again will ensure the department understands you family's preferences and any shifts or trends in demand. Our school does not have an OSHC service, and the department is seeking your feedback to better understand the demand for OSHC across the state in 2026.

While completing this survey does not mean a service will be established at our school, it will help the department better understand the needs of our local community to help inform the planning and implementation of OSHC services across the state.

I highly encourage you to complete the survey, even if your family does not need OSHC. All responses to the survey will help give a holistic view of demand, and it's as important for the department to understand where the demand for OSHC is low as much as it's important to understand where the demand for OSHC is high.

The survey has only 5 questions and takes 2 minutes and is completely anonymous. Your answers will never identify you or your child.
