The last newsletter we sought community feedback seeking input into the idea of getting a 'Companion Dog' to support our students. We didn't receive many replies, so are seeking your input again. If we don't receive more community feedback regarding a companion dog, we will assume that there isn't the need and won't pursue this any further. If you would like to have your say, take this opportunity now!





Animals have the amazing ability to support students when they are upset or heightened. The plan is to obtain a pup (Golden Retriever or Labrador) and employ a dog trainer to train the dog, with the support of the students. Obviously, there are a number of things that we need to ensure happens to support our students, staff and families, but before any of that can or will occur, we are seeking feedback from the

community. The dog will be attached to an individual staff member and will not be on site or available for students to access at all times, as we also need to ensure the wellbeing needs of the dog are being met. We appreciate that everyone is different; some people have dog allergies, some people are afraid of dogs and some people have not had much experience or opportunity to be around dogs. We would best aim to support all students in families if we have an awareness of what the 'issues / concerns' are. Please take the time to scan the QR code and answer the questions / provide feedback. Whilst feedback can be anonymous, we are asking any responders to include their names so we can contact families if we need extra clarification on something raised. Governing Council have already endorsed this next stage (seeking community input) so now is your opportunity to have your voice heard.



Breakfast Club / Fruit Snacks

Recently, we have noticed more and more students are attending Breakfast Club or coming to Student Services requesting a fruit / brain snack. Whilst we would love to be in a position to provide this to all students, quite simply we are facing a major shortfall. The aim of both Breakfast Club and Fruit / Brain Snack, is to supply those students with either breakfast or brain food to help

them on a successful learning path for that day. We are finding that a lot of students are having breakfast at home, or at OSHC and then having a second or even third breakfast at school, which means that those students that have a genuine need, may be missing out. Once again, we ask that families have a chat to their children about whether they need an additional breakfast / brain snack as we simply can't afford to be purchasing large quantities of bread to meet the demand. Alternatively, if any families wish to donate either loaves of bread or fresh fruit, these will be gratefully accepted to help us meet the demand. Failing this, we may have to start rationing toast and fruit to try and meet the need.

Pupil Free Day

Friday 24/10 (today) was the last of our Pupil Free Days for 2025. The whole staff took a deep dive into our site Perspective Survey (school perception and culture), further exploration into PAT (Progressive Achievement Testing) with a focus on Maths with the afternoon spent forward planning for 2026. Always a meaningful and productive day where staff can collaborate and learn together for improved outcomes of student learning.

Helping Your Child Learn at Home

Understanding Cognitive Load

For children with autism, learning can be hard when there's too much happening at once. Knowing how your child's brain takes in information can help reduce frustration and build confidence.

What Is Cognitive Load?

"Cognitive load" means how much information the brain can handle at one time. It's like a computer — if too much is open, it slows down.

There are **three types** of load:

- 1. Intrinsic Load How hard the task is.
- 2. Extraneous Load The extra things that make learning harder.
- 3. **Germane Load** The good thinking that helps learning stick.

There are ways that you can support your child at home, to ensure they have the correct amount of space to take on board instructions and to learn.

1. Break It Down

Give one step at a time.

Instead of "Get ready for bed," try:

"First, brush your teeth."

"Next, put on your pyjamas."

2. Use Visuals

Many children with autism learn best when they can see what to do.

Try picture charts, checklists, or short videos.

Visuals make instructions clear and build independence.

3. Reduce Distractions


Before your child starts a task (homework), make the space calm.

Turn off the TV, clear the table, or use headphones.

A quiet space helps the brain focus.



A few students in D02 enjoyed preparing and painting timber with John. While others were busy in the vegetable garden with Mrs P.










C07 students couldn't get enough of the orchard, weeding and moving compost to the vegetable gardens while searching for grubs.

PREMIERS READING Challenge



The Premier's Reading Challenge continues to be a great success for Playford Primary students. This year 260 students completed the challenge by reading and recording at least 12 books. Awards including medals and certificates will be handed out as soon as they arrive. Congratulations to all the students for their persistent focus on reading, and the adults who read with them. The PRC is just one way that children can explore new stories in their journey to becoming an independent reader. A recent survey of our Year 3-6 students revealed that the top 3 challenges to improve their reading were understanding new vocabulary, making time to read and focusing for longer periods of time. You can help your child with all of these challenges by talking with them using big words, once explained, they will understand more than you realise. Setting aside time each day for reading is also critical in helping your child focus and develop reading stamina. Bedtime is a great time to switch off devices and open a book. For more information about how reading at night can benefit you and your child take a look at this advice from Healthline https://bit.ly/3sNKYkL
