AUTISM INCLUSION

Supporting Children During the School Holidays

The school holidays can be an exciting time, but the change of routine can sometimes feel tricky for children with autism. Here are some simple ideas to help your child feel calm, supported and ready to enjoy the break.

Keep a Simple Routine

- Try to keep wake-up, meal and bedtime times similar each day.
- Let your child know early if plans change.

Prepare for Outings

- Talk about where you're going and what it might look or sound like.
- Pack comfort items such as headphones, fidgets, snacks or a favourite toy.

Support Social Situations

- Explain who they'll see and how long you'll be there.
- Give your child a small "job" to boost confidence (e.g., carrying a bag or choosing the music).

Talk About Feelings

- Use clear, simple language or visuals to talk about emotions.
- Ask, "How is your body feeling?"
- Help them practise what to do if a situation feels "too loud" or "too busy."

Every child is different, and small adjustments can make a big difference in helping them feel calmer, supported, and ready to enjoy the holidays.








Guitar Lessons at Playford Primary




TERM 4 FROM THE KITCHEN

The Fire Danger Season generally runs from November through to April, although

The exact dates are published prior to the Fire Danger Season on the CFS website

During the Fire Danger Season restrictions are placed on lighting fires to reduce the chances of large fires starting.

These restrictions are escalated when a Total Fire Ban Day is declared

South Australia is divided into 15 Fire Ban Districts.

The Fire Ban Districts are:

- Adelaide Metropolitan
- 2. Mount Lofty Ranges
- 3. Kangaroo Island
- 4. Mid North
- 5. Yorke Peninsula
- 6. Murraylands
- 7. Riverland 8. Upper South East
- 9. Lower South East
- 11. North East Pastoral
- 12. Eastern Eyre Peninsula
- 13. North West Pastoral
- 14. Lower Eyre Peninsula
- 15. West Coast

Bushfires and the law



Police officers have the lawful authority to take preventative action to stop bushfires from starting. This authority applies all year round, not just during the Fire Danger Season¹

The law states:

If a police officer is satisfied that:

- A person proposes to carry out an activity of a kind prescribed by the regulations, or any other activity that may cause
- Due to weather conditions, the fire, (if caused by the activity), might get out of control,
 Then a police officer may direct that person to stop the activity during a period specified in the direction.

What is an activity of a kind prescribed by regulations²?

- ere are many specific activities, but common ones includ
- Lighting and maintaining a fire.
- Operating a gas fire or electrical cooking element
- Operating an appliance for welding, soldering, metal cutting, grinding or abrasion.

Roadblocks and closures

For many reasons, travelling into, or through, the scene of an emergency can be dangerous and potentially telat. Therefore, such travel must be controlled and minimised to reduce risk to the community and ensure clear access for triefighters. Roadblocks are usually managed by police officers though responsibility may also be delegated to other authorised personnel such as liredighters or the State Emergency Service.

Additional powers during a declared bushfire

and other authorised officers have powers under the Emergency Management Act 2004 to

- Direct or prohibit the movement of persons, animals or vehicles³.
- Require a person to provide such information as may be reasonably required in the circumstances'

The Fire Danger Season

It is important to know which districts you live in, you may travel through and you work in, as restrictions may differ for each district on a day-to-day basis.

Each district has individual Fire Danger Season dates

Dates and restrictions for each district may vary due to fuel loads, rainfall, ground moisture levels, and population densities.

To find which district you live in and the Fire Danger Season dates for your district, visit the CFS website www.cfs.sa.gov.au and use the interactive map and map legend to find your location.

Fire Danger Ratings

Fire Danger Ratings indicate the degree of difficulty of stopping a fire under the predicted weather conditions.

The Bureau of Meteorology, in partnership with CFS, determines the Fire Danger Ratings based on a combination of predicted weather conditions and current observations

The official Fire Danger Rating for the following day is issued after 4:30pm by the CFS, and includes preliminary forecasts for the next four days

The ratings do not predict how likely bushfires are to occur, but rather how a fire would behave if one started

The higher the Fire Danger Rating, the more dangerous the fire conditions are in that district.

Fire Danger Ratings should be used to determine your Bushfire Survival Plan response for the following days.

Fire Danger Ratings forecast two to four days out should be used as a guide only and may change.

Bushfires and the law

Did you know it is an offence to:

- Light or maintain a fire in the open during the Fire Danger Season, unless you comply with the following requirements:
- The fire is contained in a properly constructed fireplace, a portable cooking appliance or a trench at least 30 centimetres deep; and
- The space immediately around and above the fire is cleared of all flammable vegetation to a distance of at least four metres; and
- The fire does not occupy an area larger than one square metre; and
- A person who can control the fire is present at the site of the fire from the time it is lighted to the time it is npletely extinguished; and
- There is an appropriate agent adequate to extinguish the fire at hand.
- If a Total Fire Ban Day has been declared in your district, you must not light a campfire or any fire for warmth or comfort without a council permit^s.

Other offences during the Fire Danger Season:

- Lighting a fire to burn off on your property or burn rubbish or grass clippings without a Schedule 9 council permit. On a declared Total Fire Ban Day, a Schedule 10 council permit is required to light a fire otherwise it is an offence
- Using an appliance for welding or soldering with an exposed flame or an appliance for metal cutting, grinding or abrasion - that produces sparks in the open air - is not permitted unless you comply with the following requirements:
- The space immediately around and above the appliance is cleared of all flammable vegetation to a distance of at least 10 metres; and
- There is an appropriate agent to extinguish the fire at hand; and
- A person who can control the appliance must be present at all times while the appliance is in use or alight.
- Use is not permitted on a Total Fire Ban Day without a permit7.

More offences to be aware of at any time of the year:

- Dropping or throwing a burning object or material from a vehicle⁸.
- Burning in the open is regulated for environmental and air quality reasons. Failure to obtain the required permit under environmental protection laws is an offence. Contact your local council for advice⁹.
- Using private fireworks10.
